2022 Senior Butt Rally Sunday, September 18, 2022 Day 1

Every rally I've ever been to has a final riders meeting just before the riders mount up to leave. Why that is necessary might be lost on anyone who has never stared with glazed eyes at a rally book for one of the events. They are usually put together with input from multiple people and assembled over a period of months or years depending on the size and length of the event. The rally book shared by the Senior Butt Rally 2022 and its junior counterpart consists of 75 pages of bonuses, instructions, pictures and warnings. The riders received the rally packet with the rally book and all related materials at approximately 8pm Saturday night before the 8am Sunday start. That would normally leave enough time to get a handle on your ride plan if it weren't for that little thing called sleep.

There are more than 200 separate bonus options the riding teams have to choose from. Somehow riders have to cull that down to something manageable over the six day rally. That's a hard enough task for one person. It tends to get harder when two opinions have to be considered. And the interpretations of the English language by two people reading the same set of instructions can be all over the map (pun intended). Thus the Sunday morning meeting becomes a necessity to clarify any remaining misunderstandings from the instructions. Add to that a discussion of how the bikes will be sent out of the parking lot and you've plenty to discuss.

And then you wait. Fifteen minutes to kill before mounting a bike to take off on a six day rally can seem like forever. So riders check and recheck GPS entries, compare routing notes with each other from the night before, double check bags, zippers, latches – and still the time seems to drag – until... the engines start firing up. And one by one the urge to get moving takes over. Riders in pairs begin to line up in the direction of the Rallymaster's announced direction of exit. You fight that little voice in your head that keeps telling you to ease off the clutch and apply the gas in sufficient quantity to propel the bike on its way without the dreaded, embarrassing stall out. But it always happens to someone. At exactly 8:00am, thanks to the preciseness of the smart phone, the Rallymaster points a finger your way and you're underway. There is no feeling like it. An adrenaline rush that heightens the senses and signals the start of your journey. And in the span of a couple of minutes, it's all over. Every bike is out of the lot and disappears into the traffic. The rally is on.

If you are shopping for a rally bike and think this group might be a good barometer of the right mount, here is the tale of the tape for this year - 16 BMW's, 6 Harley's, 5 Honda's, 5 Yamaha's, 4 Kawasaki's, 1 Suzuki, 1 Triumph, 1 Victory and 1 Can Am. That was at the start of the day. What leaves the starting line and what appears at the finish line, and with what numbers, are always moving targets. We'll check back at the finish to see how successful each brand was from a mechanical standpoint.



The undisputed king of the Senior Butt Rally, James Owen, takes the pole position in the starting field as a result of having the lowest IBR Finisher 3-digit number in the field, 281. His ride of choice, a 2022 "Racing Blue" BMW R1250RT. He is joined this year by New Zealander, Chris Wiltshire on a 2021 Kawasaki Concours. Chris was overheard asking James, "How long does it take to get out of Texas"?
